Hello Friends,

To get to know me better, I want to share a few things about my background. I was raised as a dog enthusiast from a very early age. My parents were very reputable breeders of Collies and Shetland Sheepdogs from the time I was in 2nd grade. I was a junior show handler and went on to compete with my dogs in both confirmation and obedience for many years. While I will always have a place in my heart for Collies, my passion turned to

Retrievers. After my first Golden Retriever, Dakota, crossed the rainbow bridge, I found GRR in my search for another Golden.

I began volunteering with GRR in 2009 working the hotline and conducting phone interviews. Eventually, I started doing home visits, was the events director for a few years and then added matchmaking to the list. Latke-19-118 Latke, now known as Willow, was adopted on March 2nd. Willow is living the good life with her new mom and dad.






Chloe 20-008 Chloe was adopted March 15th and is proud to brag that the GRR family rescued her into the life she deserves!

Chloe came to us from an owner surrender in Laredo.




This is **Murphy 20-017** who was adopted on March 21st and now goes by the name of Bentley.



snuggle.


- Also likes to help you with your work, especially when you are on your laptop. She'll be sure to stick her nose in where it doesn't belong

Tax Day Extended until July 15, 2020

On March 20th, it was announced that TAX DAY has been extended until JULY 15, 2020 for both filing and payment of taxes..

Tax Deductibility reminder

As a 501(c)(3), GRR is a "qualified organization". The IRS allows you to claim the following deductions as charitable contributions, if you itemize: Mileage for every mile you travel for GRR purposes: vet appointments, transport, home visits, etc. Direct expenses such as food, medical supplies and other items for a foster dog. Money spent on envelopes, postage, containers for supplies, baggies for supplies, membership fees, dues, etc.

From publication 526: "You may be able to deduct membership fees or dues you pay to a qualified organization. However, you can deduct only the amount that is more than the value of the benefits you receive." GRR always recommends that you talk with your tax consultant/adviser on all deductions. 15 Minute Games to Play with Your Dog

You've got a full schedule ahead of you and a dog who's begging for your attention. While it might be tempting to go for a quick walk and call it a day, a better way to take the edge off your pup's pent-up energy is a quick 15-minute game to play with your dog, one that taps into their natural drive and incorporates body and brain.

The following dog activities are on near-constant rotation in our home, whether I only have

a few minutes to spare or I have the luxury of spending more time playing with my dogs, Millie and Olive. Fifteen minutes isn't a huge time investment, but if you play the right kind of games, your dog will thank you for the good time.

Tug-of-War

People used to mistakenly believe that playing tug-of-war could cause aggression in dogs, but playing it with a few simple rules is actually a fantastic way to quickly exercise your pup. The rules of tug-of-war are simple:

- 1. Your dog waits to take the tug toy until you present it.
- 2. They release the toy when you ask.
- 3. They respond to "sit," "wait" and "down" during breaks in play to encourage focus and discourage over-excitement.

The type of toy you use to play this game with your dog is important since your dog is likely to have a preference for both the size and texture of it. Smaller dogs might enjoy a soft toy like the KONG Scrunch Knots Fox Toy, while bigger and more energetic tuggers might benefit from a rope toy like the Frisco Rope with Squeaking Ball toy, which puts enough space between the eager mouth and delicate fingers.


Tug-of-war is a perfect quick game because it's easy, it doesn't require much space and adding the training element in between rounds helps your dog's training stay fresh.



Do you have sago palm trees near your home? Or does your dog walk take you near any sago palms? Sago palm trees are extremely toxic to dogs, and ingesting any part of the plant can be fatal to your dog.

These palm trees, for all their beauty, are so toxic – and, in so many destinations, so common. Many homes and businesses across Texas feature them, and they're especially common the closer you get to the coast. We even see them on the grounds of dog-friendly hotels, which is really frightening.

These palms are low-rise plants, and can even sometimes be found potted. You've no doubt seen them in one size or another. If you have sago palms near your home–or you might run across them on your day trips or travels with your dog, please be sure to read this story by Tampa's Keene Veterinary Hospital:

Paula Tatgenhorst had been living in Tampa for only nine months after relocating from St. Louis, Missouri for a new job opportunity. Her three rescue dogs, Bella, Boomer and Cindy had made the trip to the Sunshine State with the rest of her family. On a warm day in March, Paula decided to do some spring gardening, which involved her replanting two seeds from a plant in her front yard into a pot on her pool patio. Hours later, she found Bella playing with one of the walnut-size seeds.
