Fireworks Safety *for pets*

Keep your pets secured INSIDE your home. Even dogs in fenced yards find ways to escape the scary sounds.

Give them a safe place to hide. Set up a comfortable room or crate in your house just for them.

Use ambient noise to mask the noise. A radio or TV playing comforting music works well.

Update their IDs & microchips *(just in case).*

Skip the celebration and stay home with them. Sometimes your presence makes all the difference.

Keep them busy. Treat toys, like Kongs, can help distract them during the display.

Nothing seems to freak them out more than this summer day (although the vet comes in a close second). The loud explosions and weird fires in the sky (or "fireworks" in human speak) are enough to send any dog running.

Best Friends Animal Society knows this better than anyone. The organization runs the nation's largest no-kill sanctuary and is the only national welfare organization dedicated exclusively to ending the killing of dogs (and cats) in America's shelters.

The 4th of July is the busiest time for them, as well as shelters across the country. With this in mind, the organization has provided a few tips to avoid any mishaps during your celebration.

1. Keep dogs indoors.

Large crowds and loud noises are sure to frazzle any pup. Keeping dogs indoors can help you keep tabs on them through all the chaos and ensure they stay safe.

2. Allocate a designated doggie room.

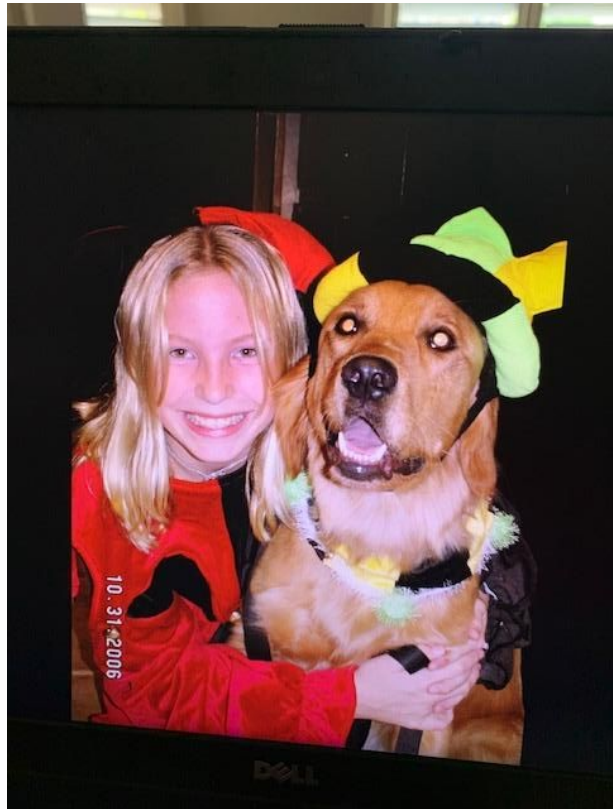
4. Make sure your dog's name tag is up to date.

She came to me in November, 2015 with her bonded partner Stevie, 12-052, who passed away in January of 2016 due to kidney failure and severe dysplasia.

Little Miss loved walks and people. At the dog park, she would spend the first half hour bouncing down the trails, nose to the ground, sniffing everything. Then she would slowly circulate between all the people, stopping to say hello and sharing her beautiful smile with each one. She especially loved children, and they loved her. There is a two year-old girl in the neighborhood who would laugh and make a 'grrrr' noise when she saw Little Miss because she thought Little Miss looked like a lion. Once introduced, the little girl would toddle toward Little Miss with arms open, and Little Miss would meet her halfway.



A couple of years ago, I took Little Miss on a trip over to the family farm in Louisiana. It was

fall and there were dry leaves all over the yard. She had a blast crunching through them, nose down, smelling all kinds of new critters.

When one of my pups leaves, it seems like the closing of a chapter in my life. She was a warm, loving companion.

Tax Day

Tax Deductibility Reminder - The Due Date This Year is July 15, 2020

As a 501(c)(3), GRR is a "qualified organization." The IRS allows you to claim the following deductions as charitable contributions, if you itemize: mileage for every mile you travel for GRR purposes, vet appointments, transport, home visits, etc. Direct expenses such as food, medical supplies and other items for a foster dog. Money spent on envelopes, postage, containers for supplies, baggies for supplies, membership fees, dues, etc.

From publication 526: "You may be able to deduct membership fees or dues you pay to a qualified organization. However, you can deduct only the amount that is more than the value of the benefits you receive." GRR always recommends that you talk with your tax consultant/adviser on all deductions.
