A Message From Our President

Hello friends,

Welcome to summer and the fun times it brings to you and vour furry companion.



Something I want to talk about this month is crating. It's important to have a dog that is comfortable in a crate as you never know when the need to crate will arise such as at the vet, traveling in a car or recovering from illness or surgery. However, we NEVER want to have our foster/adopted dogs spend excessive hours in a crate

whether day, night or a combination.

Many of our dogs have never been crated so to successfully crate train a dog takes days or weeks. The crate must be trained to be a very positive experience and place. It should never, ever be used as a place of punishment. When getting a dog acclimated to a crate, there must be positive reinforcement and force should NEVER be used to push/pull them into a crate. A well-respected dog trainer, Susan Garrett, has a series called Crate Games that I highly recommend for crate training.

We talk extensively about decompression and initial separation when bringing a new dog into a home with other dogs. Decompression can be successfully achieved using gates rather than crating. There are many different types of gates on the market ranging from those with cat doors to 16 feet long for use with larger, open areas. Using an "x-pen" can be beneficial when needing to keep a dog in a smaller safe space.

We know Golden Retrievers are people dogs and live their best lives when close to their families. If a dog chooses to lay in its crate and the door is open, that's great. However, most dogs have been rehomed to GRR because they have already been separated from their family too much and deserve to be placed in a better situation.

Safety is most important and can be achieved through multiple avenues rather than crating. This interesting article is a great resource for providing additional insight into crating. If you have questions, please reach out to our Training Team.








Bristol 24-038

Charlie Mae (Honor) 17-081 **Cindy Caffee Kralis**


